






MIDDLETOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT



From the desk of Chief Rob Herman

I want to remind everyone that if you need to speak to a Middletown Police officer or need to report a crime, please call the **Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO) Dispatch at 502-574-5471**. JCSO is responsible for our dispatching and radio calls, and they are the ones who will send an officer to you should you need to report an incident or accident. As always, if it is an emergency, you can dial 911 and they will immediately transfer you to JCSO dispatch.

As we welcome summer and start to do more outside activities, now is the time to check around our homes for any security lighting that needs to be repaired or replaced. This winter you thought about adding a ring doorbell or security cameras and now is the time to do that. These inexpensive devices can be a deal breaker in helping our officers and detectives solve crime or even answer the question of that unusual noise outside my window last night. It is always a relief to look back at your video and see a deer or possum running through your yard instead of a burglar. Which brings me to the hot topic right now of nighttime break ins to automobiles. This is not my first time discussing this issue, I have brought this up just about every quarter in my newsletter articles. Those that are taking the precautions are most certainly tired of me talking about it, however there are many more that are not listening.



Rule number one, keep your vehicle doors locked all the time, even if you park in a garage – Lock your doors.

Rule number two is do not keep valuables in your vehicle in plain view. Remove those valuables, such as firearms, wallets, purses, extra car keys, money, laptops, golf clubs, etc.

I would also recommend that you keep your garage door remote out of sight or remove it all together. There have been several reports of vehicles being entered and the thieves just push the garage door remote to gain access to your garage, and if you don't keep your door locked to your house, they now have access to your home. Those are two simple rules to



live by these days. We have numerous videos of these criminals checking door handles on vehicles and if they are locked, they move on, if unlocked, they enter and see what valuables they can steal.

Now you may ask, what is the police department doing to combat these crimes. First and foremost, we are aggressively patrolling your streets as you sleep. I will also be adding two additional officers to the late watch shift to put more eyes in your neighborhoods. Our detectives have also teamed up with Louisville Metro Police and several other agencies to gather intelligence on these folks and to work on crime reduction details throughout the Metro Louisville. But you are the eyes and ears on your street, if you see/hear something, please say something. Call our JCSO dispatch as you see these suspicious activities and we can respond to check them out. A huge word of caution, video intelligence has confirmed that these nighttime criminal raiders are armed with handguns and have also been seen with one or two providing overwatch with rifles. I would not recommend confronting them as there are also incidents of them shooting at the homeowner as they are being confronted.



Lastly, the most received complaint our office hears about is the amount of traffic on our roads and the blatant disregard for traffic laws. The amount of traffic on our roads is a by-product of growth in both residential and retail establishments. There is very little the police department can do about the numbers of vehicles on the roadway; we can work on the behavior of those vehicles on the road. You can help make our roadways safer by paying attention to the traffic laws and to be hyper-vigilant at intersections. Most accidents could have been avoided if only the drivers were paying attention to the roadway and not being distracted by other influences such as cellphones or even other occupants in the vehicle.



My officers and I take pride in our city. With your help, we can make Middletown a safer, more enjoyable place to live, raise our families, and work. If you have any suggestions or comments, please feel free to let us know.

PAY BEFORE NOVEMBER 1, 2024 TO RECEIVE A 15% DISCOUNT!

You should receive your 2024 Middletown property tax bills by September 15, 2024. You can now obtain tax information: middletownky.igovservices.com

With the online tax payment software, you can perform any of the following actions and more:

- Make payments by credit card or check
- Print tax bill
- View payment history
- See property assessment

Online Tax Payment instructions

You do not have to create an account to view or pay online. Simply click in the “Search” at the top of the next screen, above the City’s logo and click “Property Tax.”

In the next search box enter your PIDN (parcel number) from your bill, enter the whole number, DO NOT INCLUDE DASHES, include any zeros before or after the number. If you do not have your PIDN you may search by name or property address.

Click on the [blue parcel number](#) to view your

account.

Click the **green “Actions” drop down menu.**

From the actions menu you can make a payment, view history or view/print your bill.

Please return the remittance on the bottom of your bill and write your PIDN number on your check.

Please do not staple, or tape your check to the remittance, send the original bill not a copy, it will disable the barcode.

There is a locked drop box on the outside of City Hall for residents that want to drop off payments after hours.



MIDDLETOWN BUSINESS UPDATE

In August 2023, the City Commission passed an ordinance creating an annual business license fee and occupational tax for all businesses within the city of Middletown boundaries. To date, we have over 1,300 businesses registered!



If you have not registered your business, please contact City Hall at 502-245-2762 and speak with Ann Kaiser. You can also register online at the city website: www.Cityofmiddletownky.org

Beginning January 1, 2024, all businesses were required to begin withholding a 1% occupational tax on their Middletown employees as well as homebased employees working in Middletown.

Payments to the City are to be filed and paid on a quarterly basis (March, June, September and December). Filings for the first quarter of 2024 were due March 31, 2024. If you have not filed your 1st quarter return, please contact City Hall and speak with Ann Kaiser.

As a reminder, the second quarter ends June 30, 2024 and filings and payments are due to be filed electronically or post-marked by July 31, 2024.

METHODIST IN MIDDLETOWN

From 1799 to 1805 a great Revival swept across the "western country," as Kentucky was called. Methodist Church founder John Wesley believed that people got tired of hearing the same preacher over and over. Wesley instructed his followers: keep moving, keep moving to call churches into being in ever new places.

Presbyterians established the first church at Middletown in 1799. So, eight times a year John Sale rode a 6-week circuit from Carrollton through the Bluegrass to Danville, west to Lake Nolin, North to Elizabethtown, then through Louisville, Middletown and Shelbyville. Sale had preached 58 times by the time he got back home. He was 31 when he came to Middletown in 1800. According to those who knew him, Sale was not the greatest speaker, but he "lighted up the Gospel themes..

The church Sale established in Middletown has lasted 200 years-- proof that he was, as everyone agreed, a very good organizer!

Middletown had 50 preachers from 1800 to 1843, including tall, blond, blue-eyed Virginia-born David



Young, who must have made every spinster regret the fact that Methodist ministers could not marry and continue in the calling.

On the other hand, there was James Leach, whose "eccentricities stood in the way of his success as a preacher." After two years at Middletown he

left the church and became a doctor.

In 1835, the Kentucky Conference adopted strong resolutions opposing liquor and declaring slavery to be "evil even in its most tolerable aspects.." The Middletown society, which became a full-fledged church in 1843, included enslaved Black members. When the church split over the slavery issue in 1845, the Middletown church became part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

We received tremendous support from our local Middletown businesses in the form of sponsorships and raffle/auction prize donations. The weather did not fully cooperate, but we still managed to host a profitable car show where a good time was enjoyed by all.

Foundation Board members have been greeted with many, many positive comments regarding the Middletown Police Department. This goes hand in hand with our mission to augment the Middletown Police Department's budget by providing funding for programs, equipment and training. We believe that in doing so, the Middletown community will benefit by being that special safe place where people can live, work and visit.

The Middletown Police Foundation is a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization that is entirely operated by unpaid volunteer Board of Directors. We rely solely on fundraising and donations. The money raised or donated is returned to the Middletown community via grants to the Middletown Police Department.
