Hopefully you have noticed the new play equipment and swing set in Cross Creek Park. The new equipment was purchased with ARPA funds.

In Wetherby Park we have extended the walking path across the creek and over by the pavilion. This expanded path means less loops for individuals counting their steps! This spring you will see a new playground in the park for children to enjoy.

Last year was a busy year for the City Commission. In 2023, we passed an updated personnel policy for our employees, passed legislation establishing a Business License and an occupational tax, paved several roads, worked with Metro to have an agreement for help with ABC enforcement, replaced play equipment, started the process to become a Certified City of Ethics, and had a very successful Middletown Family Fun Fest. As our city continues to evolve we must continue to work together to maintain our quality of life and sense of neighborhood.



From the desk of Chief Rob Herman

I want to remind everyone that if you need to speak to a Middletown Police Officer or need to report a crime, please call the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO) Dispatch at 502-574-5471. JCSO is responsible for our dispatching and radio calls, and they are the ones who will send an officer to you should you need to report an incident or accident. As always, if it is an emergency, you can dial 911 and they will immediately transfer you to JCSO dispatch.

Welcome to the new year of 2024! I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season and is looking forward to a great new year. As we take down our holiday decorations, take a few moments to make sure your windows are locked, and your security lights are working. If you receive a new security camera as a



gift, be sure to install it correctly and become familiar with its operation. I can't begin to tell you how valuable security cameras have been to our investigations. Those cameras can hold the necessary information to lead our detectives in the right direction or even solve crimes.

Private in-car cameras are becoming popular for motorist these days, if you think you caught something that can be useful to an investigation, please contact us at 502-365-1900 or if you wish to remain anonymous you can give us a call on our tip line at 502-755-4MPD (4673).

Another valuable crime prevention tip is know your neighbors. There is nothing better than having an eyewitness to a crime, and if your neighbors see something unusual around your property, they can quickly call the police and increase our response time, and hopefully catch the criminals in the act or even prevent them from committing a crime in the first place.

The number one complaint I receive is traffic related, whether it is speeding on neighborhood streets or reckless driving on our major roadways. This increase in lack of respect for the traffic laws of our Commonwealth is leading to more accidents on the roadways and an increase in traffic-related fatalities. If you have new drivers in your household, stress the importance of following the traffic laws and staying focused during their travels. A lot of these acci-



dents could have been avoided if only strict attention was given to the operation of the motor vehicle and driving with some common sense.

Another crime related complaint that is commonly reported is theft of mail. I highly recommend that if you are sending anything financial related such as checks, gift cards, or cash that you hand deliver those to the drop box inside the post office or to the clerk at the desk. I cannot recommend any of the postal service blue drop boxes as a secure means to send mail as those are still being targeted by criminals. As they say, an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of hurt.

While we are on the topic of theft, there is an overall rise in telephone and email scams, especially targeting the elderly. Some advice is to be curious and do your homework before you sign up or answer any questions about products or services that you did not order. If it is too good to be true, then it is probably not real. Ask for contact information or phone numbers to call them back. Then do some research about the product or service. If it is a legitimate business, you should be able to find all their information on the internet. If in doubt, call a family member or friend to run it past them first before committing or sending money.



The beginning of a new year usually brings new resolutions so be sure to include some of these crime prevention tips and safe driving habits that I have mentioned so that your new year is a safe and enjoyable one.






STREETLIGHT OUT?

WHAT TO DO WHEN IT SNOWS

Please pay attention to the forecast and refrain from parking in the street if they are predicting snow and/or ice so the streets are properly cleared.



MIDDLETOWN BUSINESS LICENSE UPDATE

In August 2023, the City Commission passed an ordinance creating a Business License and a \$50 annual fee to be paid by November 1 every year. In October, invoices were mailed to all known Middletown businesses.

Since this is a new requirement, businesses are registering daily. We continue to reach out to businesses to update our list and gain compliance. Every day we discover new businesses!

Late notices were mailed in December to all businesses not in compliance.

Many thanks to all the businesses that have complied! We appreciate your business and willingness to help Middletown maintain a high quality of life for all residents.



MIDDLETOWN OCCUPATIONAL TAX UPDATE

Beginning January 1, 2024, all businesses are required to begin withholding the 1% occupational tax. Payments to the City are to be filed and paid on a quarterly basis. The first filing date is March 31, 2024, with an extension date of April 30, 2024 to file and pay.

THE MIDDLETOWN INN BUILT 1798

The Middletown Inn is located at 11705 Main Street on the northeast corner of Madison Avenue and Main Street in Middletown. Also known as the Thormalen Home, the inn is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The original portion, located at the east side of the building, is composed of a four bay, two-story log structure, supported by beech logs. The front door with a three-light transom is located in the second bay from the east and the windows have an eight-over-eight pane sashes. The lot first sold for fifteen dollars. James G. Speer built the log portion of the structure in 1798. There are 15 steps on the stairwell to commemorate Kentucky's statehood, its entrance into the Union as the fifteenth state. The brick portion is believed to have been built around 1804. In 1921, Sherman Wetherby coated the entire building with stucco, a one-story shop was added on the west end and the front porch was built. On the roof reside a few ornate lightning rods. A large stone smokehouse stands just to the rear of the building. The lot is about a third of an acre and is Block 22 of Lot 329.

John Evans owned the building in 1815, and it prob-

ably housed the tavern he operated. In 1850, Dr. Robert V. Sprowl bought the building. In 1872, Dr. Sprowl sold it to Edward T. Hord. The building became the Hord Hotel and was owned by the Hord family until 1921. The Hord family also operated a grocery and bakery from the building. The Hord family sold the building to Will Schindler, who had three daughters (Emma Lou Moore, and Ruth and Mary Pearce). Schindler founded the Middletown Hotel Company and used the building to operate his hotel, rooming house, billiard parlor and confectionery. Since 1933, the Middletown Inn has been used for a residential home and apartment. Joseph Thornmahlen bought the house in 1933, during the depression, at an auction. He and his wife resided in the building and ran a restaurant in the inn and Frances, his wife, ran the Olde Inn Beauty Shop during the years of World War II.

The Middletown Inn is significant as one of Middletown's oldest commercial buildings. You can read more in the book "Middletown Days and Deeds" by Edith Woods available at the Historic Middletown Inc Museum at 11700 Main Street.

Historic tax credits (HTC) have proven to be one of the nation's most successful and cost-effective community revitalization tools .
