

Improving Public Spaces

I want to remind everyone that if you need to speak to a Middletown Police officer or need to report a crime, please call the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO) Dispatch at 502-574-5471. JCSO is responsible for our dispatching and radio calls, and they are the ones who will send an officer to you should you

need to report an incident or accident. As always, if it is an emergency, you can dial 911 and they will immediately transfer you to JCSO dispatch. Additionally, our office phone line (502-365-1900) is only monitored during normal business hours of Monday-Friday 8:30-5:00. If you leave a message, it may not be addressed until the next business day.

Spring is upon us and as we get out into our yards, don't forget to check on your neighbors. Now is the time to adopt good crime prevention habits, such as making sure your security lights work, installing those cameras you received for Christmas, and keeping those doors and windows locked, especially on your vehicles. The roving car bandits are still out there, going through unlocked vehicles and if you leave your keys in the vehicle you will wake up to your vehicle missing.

If you should see any suspicious activity around your house or neighborhood, please give us a call as you are seeing the activity. We can ask questions and be able to respond quickly to hopefully catch those criminals in the act.

Lastly, use patience as you drive on our city streets. We are receiving more and more calls for angry drivers whereas if everyone just took their time and practiced compassion while driving, I think there would be a lot less accidents and not as many road rage incidents. Be kind.

My officers and I take pride in our city. With your help, we can make Middletown a safer, more enjoyable place to live, raise our families, and work. If you have any suggestions or comments, please feel free to let me know.

Abell/Able and Gwathmey Families of Middletown

Joseph Abell born in 1752 married Catherine Hartley, who was born in 1771 emigrated to Kentucky from Maryland. On June 13, 1803 while living in Mason County he purchased 600 acres in Jefferson County. Sometime after 1803 on this 600 acres Joseph Abell built the red brick house that still stands to this day at what is now 12210 Old Shelbyville Road.

Joseph and Catherine Abell had fourteen children, ten of whom lived to adulthood. Among them were: Elizabeth who married Jeremiah Diller; Deborah

married Robert Gwathmey; George married Elizabeth O'Neil; Angeline married William Bull; Margaret married Charles Kane; William married Catherine Anne Burke, and upon her death, married her sister Mary; Lucy Ann married Joseph Gwathmey and had a daughter Margaret who married Hiram Benjamin Wood.

Another branch of the family, which spells the name "Able," descended from pioneer Joseph's son George, who married Alice Talbott. Before 1855, George and Alice operated a hotel called the Twelve Mile House. This building was later converted into the Jefferson Female Academy and is now the site of Middletown First Baptist Church. Their Children were: Louise, Ann, Joseph Daniel and William Haycraft Abel I who was a captain in the Confederate Army and later sheriff of Jefferson County for several years. William H. Able I married his first cousin, Catherine Able on March 8, 1859 at Middletown by the Rev. William Tharp. They lived for a time in the Benjamin Head stone house.

Owen Gwathmey emigrated from Wales to Virginia and had two sons, Richard and Owen. The son Richard Gwathmey had a son Joseph Gwathmey who married Lucy Ann Able. The family name Gwathmey is sometimes misspelled Gwathney.

You can also call 502-589-1444 during business hours. Knowing the nearest address is needed when reporting a malfunctioning light.

When It Snows: Don't Park in the Street!



BUSINESS LICENSE AND OCCUPATIONAL

Business License Renewal for 2025

All businesses located within Middletown, KY are required to purchase and maintain a business license. Renewal invoices were mailed to all businesses of record in early September 2024. If your business has not received a renewal invoice, please contact City Hall at 502-245-2762. Business licenses issued in 2024 expired December 31, 2024. Our office is located at 11803 Old Shelbyville Rd.

Upcoming Occupational Tax Filing Requirements

The City of Middletown's first year of occupational tax collection began in 2024. Fourth quarter filings were due by January 31, 2025. Additionally, all businesses were required to submit an annual reconciliation on or before February 28, 2025. The annual reconciliation form and all other tax forms can be found on our website: www.cityofmiddletownky.org.

Q1 2025 occupational tax filings are due on or before April 30, 2025.

As a reminder, occupational tax returns are due following each calendar quarter—March, June, September, and December. We allow an additional 30 days past the quarter-end date for filing and payment of any tax due.

Lumos Fiber

Lumos Fiber is making a big investment in Middletown by expanding its 100% fiber-optic internet network. With plans to lay over 1,300 miles of fiber in Jefferson County, Lumos will bring faster, more reliable internet to homes and businesses. Engineering work starts later this year, and construction will follow. Leading the local efforts is Grace Simrall, who previously worked for Louisville Metro Government. This project will help improve connectivity and support growth in our community.

Wetherby Park

Phase 1 of Wetherby Park is now complete, and Phase 2 is officially underway with an estimated completion date at the end of April! The City of Middletown was a recipient of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. The City Commission designated those funds for a number of important projects, including road paving, expanding the police department staff, and creating Wetherby Park. Thanks to this funding, new playground equipment was purchased and installed earlier this year.

Mayor Byron Chapman shared, “*Wetherby Park is more than just a playground—it’s an investment in the families of Middletown. We’re building a space where memories are made, where neighbors connect, and where our community continues to grow stronger together.*”

Founded in 2021, the Middletown Police Foundation is a vital organization dedicated to enhancing the safety and well-being of the citizens, visitors, and businesses of Middletown, Kentucky. With a mission to “Prepare and Support Those Who Protect and Serve,” the foundation plays a crucial role in fostering a strong bond between the Middletown Police Department (MPD) and the community.

Vision and Mission: The foundation’s vision is to ensure that the MPD is well-equipped to maintain a safe environment for everyone in the community. By providing critical resources such as training, equipment, public education, and support for officers, the Middletown Police Foundation aims to enhance the capabilities of the police department.

This includes investments in tools such as Ariel Drones, Training Equipment, and Mobile Drug Testing Equipment.
